TIBER TALKS OF BELIEF

Travis stood in disappointment, and then he heard a voice coming from behind him. He turned and saw a large mountain lion lying down by his legs. It said, "That was one beautiful eagle, wasn't it, Travis?"

"I might have known you would do something like this Tiber. And you were not even original enough to use a different spiritual introduction form this time."

"Why should I? We first met here, and I was in this mountain lion's form, and you loved it. Didn't you?"

"I guess so. In any case, I'm glad to see you, Professor. I was concerned that you were not going to show up. I asked and asked and asked, and you didn't show. Were you angry with me?"

Tiber's cougar form began to fade, and in its place stood a handsome man's form in a plaid shirt and khaki pants. He had a neat beard which was unusual for Tiber, but it still was. He said. "No! I wasn't angry, but I was a little disappointed that your request came across more like a demand, my boy. The attitude caused me not to be very much in a hurry, even though I love to do these lessons with you."

"I thought that you might have taken it that way, and I am sorry Tiber. I was just very much wanting to have this lesson and thought you might respond faster if I was urgent about it."

"Sure, and you thought I was a genie in a bottle and would pop out at your command. It doesn't work that way, boy!"

"It won't happen again Tiber. Now can we get on with the lesson?"

"I suppose we will have to. It seems that I can't fight this teenager attitude thing that has control of you, so let's get going. And we will start like we normally do. Give me your idea of what you think a Belief is."

"OK! I learned from Merriam-Webster that Belief is a state or habit of mind in which trust or confidence is placed in a person, a thing, or an idea. It is accepted or considered to be true or perhaps held as an opinion. If you are convinced about something, it is a belief. How is that Tiber?"

"Good! As usual, we will try to expand on that from two perspectives. First, from the earthly realm point of view and then from the spiritual application of what a belief is."

Tiber continued, "While you are living in this earthly plane of existence, it is often left to philosophers to define how you should define a certain thought. In the case of the thought that is Belief, the majority of philosophers seem to posit that it is simply a matter of what is true and what is false when deciding whether to believe in something or not. Of course, that leaves the problem of determining what is true and not in any given subject. That can, of course, can be very difficult."

Tiber then continued, "Let's take an example of good or bad. You can have difficulty determining exactly where an action falls in either a good or bad category. Regarding religious beliefs, one would think that the Ten Commandments are something we can all believe in. Let's discuss this and see if you are likely to believe what you read or abide by."

"Let's start with the first one." *I am the LORD, your God, and you shall have no other Gods before me.* "Now, you have no way to determine if this is a true statement, so you have to accept it on faith alone. Faith is entirely distinct from Belief, but you are free to accept this idea and use it if you desire."

"The second one is." You shall not make unto me any graven images. "The term graven is further defined in Exodus 20:4-5 'You shall not make for yourself a carved image—any likeness of anything that is in heaven above, or that is in the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth; you shall not bow down to them nor serve them.' "Like Commandment Number One, you have no idea of what a Deity looks like, but if you have decided to accept one by faith, this Commandment restricts you from making a representation of a deity of any kind. One would assume that sons of Deities, such as Jesus or his mother, Mary are

exemptions to the ruling. In any event, your faith will dictate how you want to believe in cases such as this".

"The third Commandment" *You shall not take the name of the LORD your God in vain*. "OK! If you want to take the first Commandment seriously, you can accept this third one as well on the faith basis, but as we discussed, not the belief basis."

"And now here is the fourth one." *Remember to keep holy the LORDS Day.* "By accepting the previous Commandments, you can accept this one by faith as well."

"The fifth one is." *Honor your father and your mother.* "This is a good and proper thing to do, particularly if your father and mother are deserving of honor, which they usually are, but not always. However, I can't see where this has to be a belief or even a faith thing. It is a practical and nice thing to do even for a heathen."

"Number six." *You shall not kill*. "We generally agree with this, but almost every culture had made many exceptions. Early Christians, Jews, and Muslims often killed with impunity and justified their actions because of war, anger, ridding themselves of "Others" they didn't like, etc. Even their bible says that you could "smite" others, including children who talk back or wives who stray or do other unwifely things. And then, what about other animals you enjoy eating, and you must kill them to do that. And is capital punishment a good thing to do? This Commandment is entirely too broad to urge most people to believe in it without clarification."

"Consider number seven." *You shall not commit adultery*. This demand is something good to discuss as well. Some religions consider this Commandment hard and unforgivable, but they don't give a call to action for their followers when the crime occurs. Most people don't know what to do about it other than say shame on you. Here again, there is nothing to believe in one way or the other. It is generally not good for a husband or wife, and we don't know if this applies to non-married couples. It's a confusing Commandment."

"Number eight is" *You shall not steal.* "This is an easy one. Whether your religion or where you exist within a culture, it is sensible to say that you should not steal. First, it is wrong, and secondly, you may get caught and make the rest of your life difficult and miserable. You should most probably believe in this one without too much conflict."

"Number nine." *You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor*. "Honoring this makes good sense, and most likely, if believed in, it would keep you honest. Do not accuse your neighbor if it is the wrong thing to do. It works pretty well to believe in this Commandment."

"And finally, here is Commandment number 10." *You shall not covet.* "This suggests, I think, that you should not lust after your neighbors' wife or, from an opposite perspective, a husband. But in reality, it means that any attempt to grab ahold of anything that doesn't belong to you, physically or by wishful thinking, is a wrongful act. Here again, it's good advice and makes sense, but the Commandment doesn't indicate what the call to action should be if you do any of this. Here again, forget the belief aspect and take it as excellent advice."

Tiber summed this up. "Now, in a review of all these Commandments, they have always been considered something you should believe in as opposed to being simple rules to follow. It was, after all, said that they were given to humankind directly from God. But as you can see from this simple analysis, Belief is not the feeling that will serve you, and you should use common or good sense when dealing with these issues. They are indeed the most proper and good advice. This same advice goes for nonreligious dealings."

Travis didn't hesitate too long before he added, "I hadn't thought much about the Ten Commandments, but I agree with you that Belief isn't how I felt about them, and I agree with you that they are mostly good sense issues. Perhaps I have to ask you a direct question. When should I apply Belief rather than any other sense such as using common sense?"

Tiber answered. "A belief is an attitude that something is surely the case that the thought or action we are considering is true and that it is true all of the time. We know that nighttime will always be devoid of the sun, and daytime will contain the sun even if clouds hide it. This fact is a truism and worthy of Belief. Snow has always been white or nearly white and not blue or green or yellow, so this truism can be considered a reliable belief. We can believe these and many other things that occur without any doubt. And when that Doubt is strong, the thought or occurrence should not be considered a belief. If an action is proper but subject to a revision, it should only be considered faith. For instance, if you fall in love with someone or something, you may say you believe you are in love, but you have a sense of faith that you love that person or thing. It can change instantly, and therefore you should not consider that you believe but rather have faith that you are in love. This concept seems to be a rather silly differentiation, but it is true. This concept is often posited that there are different degrees of Belief. Although this may also be true, just as there are degrees of faith, a preponderance of truism must be evident to consider it a proper belief."

Travis offered. "How important is determining that you believe in something Tiber?

"It is very important because a solid belief will assist you in establishing your existence and your life's goals. And when it is understood and applied on a spiritual basis, it becomes the impetus for causing things to happen."

"What does that mean?"

"It means that Belief is the first step to create anything, Travis. Do you recall my giving you my Four Crowns of Creative Endeavors?"

"I do! You called it the IWEB process, and I liked it. I stood for Imagination. You said you used Imagination to start the creative process. The W stood for Willpower, which you used to propel you into the direction you needed to accomplish or obtain something. The E stood for Effort, and you said this was the hardest of the Four Crowns because it had to be exerted as sincerely and as prolonged as necessary to cause your creations to manifest themselves. And finally, the B was for Belief. The soul often wants to conjure up the desired creation but aborts the Effort because it does not believe enough. You said that without Belief in

what you are trying to accomplish, it is pretty hard, if not impossible, to reach your creative goals."

"Excellent, my boy! You remembered the Four Crowns, or IWEB, almost word for word. And when you are dealing in the Spiritual Realms, Belief becomes the essential ingredient in the recipe of life. If you don't believe, your Imagination is always weak. If you don't believe in it, your Willpower is also always weak and ineffective. You won't attempt to put an appropriate effort into whatever you attempt to create. If you doubt what you are trying to accomplish in both the Spiritual or the Obstructed Realms, you will fail in the task at hand. Therefore you should consider Doubt as to the opposite of Belief. This statement is the secret. If you wish to Believe, you must remove Doubt from your mind. They are not compatible. This word is important for you to remember."

"I got it!"

"Good!"

"Thank you, Tiber. I knew that this would be an important lesson, and I was right. I had a feeling that it was important to believe in those things I should believe in and doubt other things that I shouldn't. And perhaps I should have believed in you more by realizing that you would show up when it was appropriate and not at my beck and call."

"And thank you, my boy, for understanding that. There is no way I will ever ignore you when you need me. You know that, but there is a time and place for everything that happens, particularly in my Realm. And the time is now for me to leave you and attend to other things."
